Show Day: Sunday, July 14th, 2019

Entry Deadline: The EastGen Showcase is a two and a half day competition for competitors between the ages of 13 and 21 as of January 1st, 2019. The program consists of an educational component with challenging, hands-on learning sessions. Show day will consist of showmanship and calf conformation classes.

Deadline for entry is Friday, May 31st, 2019. NO LATE ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED.

Online Registration: EastGen Atlantic Showcase will be online registration. Registration will open on April 15, 2019 and will close on May 31, 2019. Following online registration, you will be notified of your acceptance and provided with additional paperwork to complete and return to your provincial 4-H office. If you do not receive this paperwork by June 7, 2019, please email Rhonda.Macdougall@novascotia.ca immediately. In order to register online you must have your calf registration information as well as a credit card for payment to the event. All participants will be required to register for the show online with payment required through Visa or MasterCard. Due to facility restrictions, registrations will be on a first-come, first-served basis. In the event we have more registrations than space, and the desire to have fair representation from all Atlantic Provinces for beef and dairy, preference will be given to members who have attended Showcase for four or LESS years in provinces that have exceeded provincial allocation. Those not accepted will have their registrations refunded.

Registration: All 4-H participants are required to be on site by 12:00 p.m. on Friday, July 12th for registration. Calves must arrive on site between 10:30 -12:00 pm on Friday, July 12th for mandatory health check/calf registration. If you will not be able to arrive by this time, please call Dale MacPhee at 506-875-1573 prior to the event to make other arrangements. **Lunch will not be provided and is the responsibility of the participant for Friday.**

Information required for registration: Name, Address, Telephone Numbers, Email, Age, Shirt Size Required, Dairy/Beef Club Leader Name, Dairy/Beef Club Leader Email, Calf Registration Number. Code of Conduct and Medical Information forms will be emailed to you by June 7th, with your acceptance notification by Rhonda MacDougall, ALC, NS Dept. of Agriculture. Please complete and return these forms as indicated on the Medical and Code of Conduct forms by June 10th.

Registration Fee: The registration fee for the 2019 EastGen Showcase is \$140.00
Payment will be processed at the time of online registration. The 2019 registration fee is non-refundable. (Exceptions will be considered for medical reasons). Overall Champions: Overall Dairy/Beef Champions will be determined using a points system:

Showmanship	250 Points
Calf	75 Points
Stall	100 Points
Clipping-effort	150 Points
Clipping-results show day	25 Points
4-H general quiz	100 Points
Presentation quizzes	200 Points
Judging skills-placings	50 Points
Judging skills-reasons	50 Points
TOTAL	1000 Points

The educational component throughout the EastGen Showcase event is mandatory for all participants. In order for participants to attend the show, they must have completed the educational sessions and any associated quizzes/activities. Overall Dairy/Beef Champions are based on total points earned in quizzes, clipping, judging, showmanship, calf conformation and team stall presentation.

Dairy Show: The show will combine breeds into one open calf show. There will not be separate, breed-specific classes. The Showcase Committee reserves the right to combine classes or divide classes into heats as deemed necessary.

Conformation Category:

Dairy calves will be divided into the five following categories: Junior Heifer Calf, Intermediate Heifer Calf, Senior Heifer Calf, Summer Yearling and Junior Yearling. Competitors must bring their 2019 4-H Calf Project.

Beef calves will be divided into classes pending the breeds and numbers of calves available. Based on numbers following registration, classes may be modified. No market steers will be permitted. There will only be heifer classes.

Showmanship Category: 4-H competitors must be between the ages of 13 and 21 as of January 1st, 2019: Competitors must be a member of a 4-H Calf Club and must exhibit their 2019 4-H Calf Project unless a special exception has been granted prior to attending the 2019 EastGen Showcase Event. Based on numbers following registration, classes may be modified.

Alternative calf: All dairy/beef competitors must exhibit their 2019 4-H Calf Project. In the event of sickness/death/contagious disease the competitor will be eligible to bring an alternate calf. Evidence of sickness/disease resulting in the removal of your 4-H project animal must be presented to the show staff prior to the show date.

* Please bring alternative calf information. Beef calves must be weaned. No nurse cows allowed. In this event, an alternate animal may be registered.

All calves must be free of ringworm, lice and warts to be eligible for competition.

4-H Dress Code for Show: Dairy exhibitors are required to wear white pants and hard soled boots and beef exhibitors are required to wear black/dark pants with hard soled boots. T-shirts for show day will be provided by EastGen.

Maximum number of competitions: Previous winners of the Overall Dairy/Beef Championship will not qualify to win the Overall Championship category in 2019.

Calf ID and Show Ethics: Each participating 4-H project calf is asked to be presented with a photocopy of the registration paper. It is mandatory that each dairy/beef calf be tagged with NLID/CCIA tags. Calves arriving at the fairgrounds without tags will not be allowed to participate in the show and will be asked to leave the grounds immediately. It is important that the Canadian cattle shows are seen to endorse good animal husbandry practices and promote the Canadian industry in the spirit of fair play. **Criticizing or interfering with the judge, show management or other exhibitors, or other conduct detrimental to the breed or show will result in disqualification from the entire event.**

Mandatory Health/Wellness Check of Calves: A mandatory health check will take place outside prior to barn entry. Calves will be inspected in the sequence of their arrival. Calves that have not passed their mandatory health and wellness check are not permitted in the Agridome. EastGen approved veterinarian/representatives have the sole discretion to determine if an animal is eligible to participate in the EastGen Showcase event. All calves must be free of illness and Zoonotic diseases such as ringworm, lice, and warts to be eligible for competition.

Meals: EastGen will provide supper on Friday as well as all nutritional breaks and meals on Saturday and Sunday for participants. A canteen will be available for all attendees on Sunday.

Transportation Arrangements at Event Completion: Be sure to arrange to have transportation for all calves available at the completion of the event (by 2:00 pm on Sunday, July 14th).

Guidelines for Leaders, Participants and Veterinarians

Judging the acceptability of calves for EastGen Youth Events

Information compiled by the Calf Health Team including: Dr's Tim Henshaw (Eastgen), Christie Morrow (Heartland Veterinary Services), Rex Crawford (Dufferin Veterinary Services and Ann Godkin (OMAFRA Veterinary Science and Policy).

Participants should bring only healthy calves to a show, clinic or achievement day. The guidelines provide a standard interpretation of what will be considered acceptable and what will not be.

Skin lesions are visible indicators of infection. The presence of skin lesions in show calves will impact on acceptance to shows. Contact a veterinarian to identify and treat skin problems and infections well in advance of show or achievement day.

1. No calves with visible warts will be accepted at the show.

Why aren't calves with any warts allowed in shows?

Visible warts are aesthetically unpleasing. The virus that causes warts is contagious to other cattle.

Rationale:

- Warts can easily be removed by a veterinarian and removal sites heal quickly
- Participants and calf owners are responsible for inspecting calves frequently to identify warts on calves as soon as possible.
- Participants and calf owners are responsible for seeking veterinary advice or assistance to remove warts at least 3 weeks prior to show dates
- Therefore, calves with any visible warts will not be allowed on the show grounds.

2. Some calves may be accepted in spite of having had ringworm.

Why aren't calves with ringworm allowed in shows?

Visible ringworm is aesthetically unpleasing. Active ringworm is contagious to other cattle and to people.

Why are some calves accepted and others not allowed in shows?

Rationale:

- Ringworm, even with effective treatment, takes a long time to completely heal. Healed ringworm may leave visible lesions or changes to the hair coat or underlying skin for months even though active infection has ended.
- Information regarding treatments given or tests done on calves (scrapings, cultures etc) will not impact on the decision regarding acceptable vs. unacceptable. Visible lesions on calves are aesthetically unappealing and regardless of other information may prevent the calf from being admitted to shows.

Calves will be accepted if all of the following are true:

- The lesion is small or moderate in size (< 2.5 cm in diameter).
- The lesion is completely hair covered.
- Discolouration of hair or skin under hair may be present

Calves will NOT be accepted if any of the following are true:

- Any lesion is greater than 2.5 cm in diameter
- Any part of the lesion is not completely hair covered

Ringworm: Examples of Acceptable and Unacceptable Skin Lesions on Calves

Acceptable because:

- Healed
- Hair covered



NOT Acceptable because:

- Clearly visible
- No hair cover
- Crusty, scabby cover
- More than one lesion
- One lesion is large (greater than 2.5 cm)
